ADMINISTRATIVE

In 2016, the District held a test for Firefighter/Paramedic due to Firefighter/Paramedic Ryan Adams leaving for Sacramento City Fire. We had many qualified candidates and hired Isaac English as a full-time Firefighter/Paramedic in November. Isaac previously worked at Rescue as both a Volunteer and Apprentice/Firefighter. We were also able to establish a hiring list in anticipation of receiving funding from the County to hire Apprentice/Firefighters. The County has a workgroup dealing with long-term funding issues for local Fire Districts.

The District is seeing a slow recovery of the housing market which has led to an increase in Property Tax revenue. This increase is not enough to off-set the loss of "Aid-To-Fire" funding. The District also will see a 50% increase in CalPERS contributions over the next five years. The fiscal year 2015-2016 audit was completed and the District received no recommendations for corrections. The MOU with the Rescue Professional Firefighters Association was renegotiated and will run from July 2016 through June 2019.

The Rescue Historical Society held a Historical Faire in May and asked permission to hold the Faire on District grounds and have tours of Station 83 as well as the Rose Springs Literary Society Hall. Captain Jones and Firefighter Balak did an excellent job of cleaning up and clearing out the upstairs area in the R.S.L.S. Hall and the Historical Society and community members appreciated being able to tour the former meeting space.

On a sad note, retired Chief Bill Knoop passed away in 2016 and his family asked to hold his memorial service at Station 83. The District opened the station to the family and friends of Chief Knoop and his memorial service was well attended.

Administrative Assistant Highlights:

- ✓ Continued to provide administrative services to the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council.
- ✓ Continued to act as clerk for El Dorado County Fire Chiefs Association Fire Ops committee.
- ✓ Participated with the El Dorado Hills Fire Department Santa Run.

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE

Annual maintenance was done on all District vehicles. E83 was out of service for many months for repairs due to issues from the accident it was involved in in 2014 it also received new tires.

Late in 2016 the responsibility for scheduling vehicle maintenance was moved to El Dorado Hills as part of our Shared Services agreement.

PREVENTION

El Dorado Hills Fire Department took over Prevention as part of our Shared Services agreement. While District staff continues to provide service to our community for things like Knox locks, smoke detector checks and public education El Dorado Hills is providing plan checks, tank inspections, driveway reviews and other services. Some of the services El Dorado Hills provided were:

The intern firefighters of The Rescue Fire Department saw another dynamic year in 2016. We have added some new faces to the roster. We have bid farewell to some old friends. We raised


money for our program as well as for charity. We ran more calls than ever before and we did it all with professionalism, pride and integrity.



He scaled the cliff and made access for the rest of the incoming crews. Jordan continues to earn his keep with hard work and dedication.

Community College. Ryan also saw action early in his internship responding with C Shift to a vegetation fire near Greenwood. Despite working in Tahoe, Ryan manages to complete his monthly quota of hours with Rescue. His experience in Tahoe has made him a more valuable asset to Rescue Fire.





2016 saw the end of a long time volunteer career when Donnie Wylie turned in his gear. Donnie spent over 20 years with Rescue as both a firefighter and Engineer. Donnie responded to countless fires at the helm of WT83. Whenever Donnie rolled in on the tender there was a little bit of relief. We had water and a capable operator. Donnie's service will be missed. We wish him well in his life after fire.

The Interns of Rescue Fire participated in several successful fundraisers in 2016. We sold Christmas trees and pumpkins to assist the RVFA. The parking lot behind the station was transformed into a food truck haven, and a thermal imaging camera was purchased with the proceeds. We were out in force for the Fill The Boot for Burns Boot Drive to benefit the FireFighters Burn Institute. Over \$10,000 was raised.

We will continue to strive for greatness in 2017, moving forward to train with the latest information to improve the service to the people of Rescue.

TRAINING





This year training was delivered through the El Dorado Hills Fire Department. The Training Division has committed to maintaining a high skill level of Department personnel and is committed to meeting industry standards for training. For example, the ISO (Insurance Service Office) industry standard requires twenty hours of fire based training per month. This is accomplished through single engine company and multi-company drills encompassing everything from hose evolutions and vehicle extrication to wildland fire drills. The division is also focusing on continuous medical training for the crews so they are current on new concepts and techniques.

Training is generated and assigned by the Training/EMS Chief with the assistance of the Training Administrative Assistant. With oversight by the Shift Battalion Chiefs, it is the Captains' responsibility to complete the training with their crews. The Training Division provides a global training calendar for the year to give the crews an idea of the scheduled training to come. Each month, a detailed list with instructions is assigned with specific training objectives. This schedule ensures the division is meeting the industry standards for training while meeting the crews personal training needs.

The El Dorado County Training Officers has opted not to host a volunteer academy this year, and going forward it seems that they will team with the Georgetown/Garden Valley academy.

Combining training with El Dorado Hills Fire Department has been of great benefit to the Department. I hope that this partnership continues to grow in the future.

(Location TBD by Captain)

- > In full safety gear perform the following task
 - Deploy crosslay for fighting a vehicle fire on the freeway.
 - Deploy the line within the lane you are working in to reduce the danger to crews working on the road.
 - · Provide for safest parking for given scenario. (uphill, upwind, traffic, etc.)
 - · Repeat until proficient.




Future plans for the District facilities include exterior painting, window replacement, new stair railing, and a new post office floor.





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


AUTOMATIC AID RECEIVED




CALL TYPES




2012-2016 INCIDENTS




ACTIVE FIRE RESPONSES




CALLS BY AREA




CALLS BY DAY




CALLS BY DUTY SHIFT




RESPONSE TIME ANALYSIS




CALLS BY TIME OF DAY




UNIT RESPONSE SUMMARY
